Prop 4 passes and makes it a lot more difficult to institute a state income tax

Texans considered 10 statewide propositions Tuesday during the election. Among those was Prop 4, which passed and makes it a lot more difficult — almost politically impossible even — for Texas to institute a state income tax. Seventy six percent of Texans voted for (1,290,493) and 24% against (407,445). Total voters for Prop 4 were 1,697,398. See the voter results of the 10 Propositions below:

Proposition 1 - Failed

Ballot Title: "The constitutional amendment permitting a person to hold more than one office as a municipal judge at the same time." Final results show, 65%

voted no and 35% voted yes.

Proposition 1 would have allowed a person to serve as more than one appointed or elected municipal judge, assuming the person was appointed to each of those positions.

Proposition 2 -**Passed**

Ballot "The constitution-

al amendment providing for the issuance of additional general obligation bonds by the Texas Water Development Board in an amount not to exceed \$200 million to provide financial assistance for the development of certain projects in economically distressed areas."

Final results show 65% voted yes and 35% voted no.

Proposition 2 allows the Texas Water Development Board to issue bonds to developing the water supply and sewer service in economically distressed areas. The total amount cannot exceed \$200 million.

Proposition 3 — Passed

Ballot Title: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for a temporary exemption from ad valorem taxation of a portion of the appraised value of certain



property damaged by a disaster.'

Final results show 85% voted yes and 15% voted

This proposition allows temporary tax exemptions for areas designated as government-declared disaster

Proposition 4 - Passed

Ballot Title: "The constitutional amendment prohibiting the imposition of an individual income tax, including a tax on an individual's share of partnership and unincorporated association income"

Final results 76% voted yes and 24% voted no.

Proposition 4 prevents the state from enacting a personal income tax unless both voters approve it in the future and lawmakers

Home builders concerns voiced to City Council at Public Hearing

tive dialog between Sanger home builders and the Sanger City Council at a Public Hearing, last month, about (Ordinance 10-29-19) establishing the "Exterior Facade Design Criteria Manual"; amending Article 3.2100 "Exterior Construction of Residential Dwellings", Chapter 3 "Building Regulations", of the Code of Ordinances.

At the beginning of the hearing, Director of Development Services Ramie Hammonds said because of House Bill 2439, the City of Sanger staff has been researching requirements with other cities and what their guidelines are, and has come up with this proposed design criteria manual. She summarized the complete design criteria manual. She noted the changes which came back from feedback to the city staff before the hearing. Earlier in the day, the city staff met with several home builders.

Some of the items discussed: Duplex buildings will be designed to appear as a single unit, but with a statement added that anything previously platted as of the effective date of this ordinance would be exempt-

ed from this requirement. On attached garage, 40% was the maximum allowable garage and with a three car garage it may be hard to get to the 40%. This requirement will now be: Attached garages with a minimum of 400 square feet and any garage facing a public street may not extend in front of the house.

A summary was provided of the point system which is basically a requirement of what the city has in the central core area of Sanger. Multi-family and amenity requirements non-residential requirements covered in the manual were summarized. Hammonds reiterated that the staff looked at several other city requirements and did a lot of research and they did not want to be out of line with what other cities were doing or be so restrictive that it is difficult for the builder. They wanted to have enough design to still have quality development in Sanger.

Thomas Mayor Muir opened the hearing to anyone who wished to speak. Many new home builders were on hand. Lisa

There was produc- Dritschler of McClintock Homes said she was grateful for the changes that the city staff has made and had already discussed them earlier in the day with Mrs. Hammonds. She indicated she was happy with the changes made to the design criteria, but would like to see a few more changes which would affect the homes they are building right now, mostly in the Sable Creek Subdivision, which is located just west of Sanger High School and Butterfield Elementary. Dritschler noted a big concern with the garages facing a public street may

dened too much, we will just pull out."

Carolyn Cashion, builder of Ultra Homes was appreciative of the changes the staff is proposing, but would like to see a few more changes. She provided some elevations of their homes and noted all of them would not be allowed to be built with the garage not being able to extend in front of the home. She said they have bought some lots that are problem lots within a cul-de-sac and the products they developed for the lots would not be allowed to be built under the new

not extend beyond the front of the house. She stated this eliminates their entire plan mix and houses they currently have under construction, do not comply. She said that this would be a hardship for them with lots already platted and model homes already constructed. She noted that she has 10 houses right now that have financing but they have not submitted a permit because they are waiting on engineering, etc. What is being proposed would eliminate their product line. They only have one plan that will comply. Dritschler was also concerned with house elevation shall not be repeated with in any (10) lot groupings. She requested if there was any way to move it to (6) lot block, that every third house can not be the same. Also the offset of the front facade requirements. She said the biggest issue is the garage not extending beyond the house front and would like to see something worked out with this issue. Matt Hackley

builder of Impression Homes, who's building in Sanger Circle on Marion Road said, "We do not like to build in cities where it is too hard to do business." He said the 10 lot block is a real problem and it gets too complicated. Also the garage not extending in front of the home, also complicates things. "We love it here (Sanger), but if it's burrules. She also brought up Item (8a. Porch). She said that they do like to build porches but the requirement says six feet and that is really to much for something that an appraiser gives no value for. They don't even put six foot porches on their custom homes. "This is why you don't see covered porches on homes much, anymore. She also had a problem with the 10 lot block rule.

Kurt Kameron, of Cameron Classic Homes and Park Homes asked if the proposed changes were an effort to circumvent the new laws in HB 2439. He noted his concerns regarding any possible conflicts in not allowing materials that are directly allowed by the building code and was concerned if there was any additional construction costs to builders because of these changes. He said that every single home he has, the garage extends in front of the home. He asked about the affect of future sales and if a study was made on the economic impact and how these changes will affect that. He also asked, if the staff had the opportunity to research regarding any pending litigation in other cities? "The six foot porch is not realistic and a four foot porch would be." The other items he had concerns with were corrected in the presentation to builders by the city staff, earlier in the day.

prove it in both the state House and Senate by a twothirds majority.

Gov. Greg Abbott said in a statement that passing Prop. 4 is a "victory for taxpayers across the Lone Star State."

"This ban on such a disastrous tax will keep our economy prosperous, protect taxpayers, and ensure that Texas remains the best state to live, work, and raise a family," Abbott said.

While not technically a ban, the chances of lawmakers instituting a personal income tax by a two-thirds majority are so remote to be nearly impossible.

The Center for Public Policy Priorities said in a statement Tuesday night that Texas' Prop. 4 "Needlessly bans the Texas Legislature from adopting a state personal income tax." It's CEO Ann Beeson called for Texas leaders to have a "thoughtful and open discussion" about revenue for the state and called for them to close corporate loopholes and "make sure everybody pays their fair share."

"Proposition 4 was completely unnecessary, but more lawmakers wanted to score political points by putting this in front of voters rather than to make serious decisions about funding our future," Beeson said in a statement.

Proposition 5 – PassedBallot Title: "The constitutional amendment dedicating the revenue received from the existing state sales and use taxes that are imposed on sporting goods to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and the Texas Historical Commission to protect Texas' natural areas, water quality, and history by acquiring, managing, and improving state and local parks and historic sites while not increasing the rate of the state sales and use taxes."

Final results show 88% voted yes and 12% voted no.

Under Proposition 5, sales tax from sporting goods goes towards the state Parks and Wildlife Department and the state Historical Commission. The current law allows lawmakers to use the funds for other purposes. The proposition would not allow for the decreased funding for parks, wildlife, and historical agencies to be more than 50%.

Proposition 6 - Passed

Ballot Title: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to increase by \$3 billion the maximum bond amount authorized for the Cancer Prevention and Research Institute of Texas."

Final results show 63% voted yes and 37% voted no.

Proposition 6 increases the maximum amount of bonds from \$3 billion to \$6 billion for the Cancer Prevention and Research Institute of Texas.

Proposition 7 - Passed

Ballot Title: "The constitutional amendment allowing increased distributions to the available school fund."

Final results show 73%

voted yes and 27% voted no. Proposition 7 doubles the amount of funding the Texas General Land Office and State Board of Education can give to the Available School Fund from \$300 million to \$600 million each

Proposition 8 - Passed

Ballot Title: "The constitutional amendment providing for the creation of the flood infrastructure fund to assist in the financing of drainage, flood mitigation, and flood control projects."

Final results show 77% voted yes and 23% voted no.

Proposition 8 creates the Flood Infrastructure Fund. The Texas Water Development Board can use the funds for flood drainage, mitigation and control proj-

Proposition 9 - Passed

Ballot Title: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation precious metal held

in a precious metal depository located in this state."

Final results show 52% voted yes and 48% voted no. Proposition 9 allows the

legislature to exempt property taxes for precious metals held in precious metal depositories.

Proposition 10 – Passed Ballot Title: "The con-

stitutional amendment to allow the transfer of a law enforcement animal to a qualified caretaker in certain circumstances.'

Final results show 94% voted yes and 6% voted no.

Proposition 10 allows law enforcement to transfer retired service animals to a qualified caretaker with no fee.

Emily was an amazing mother and friend, and brought happiness


and love into the lives of all those that knew her. She will be sorely missed and will be remembered forever.

your long-term success.







Denton County offices will be closed on Thursday, Nov. 28, and Friday, Nov. 29, for Thanksgiving. All offices will reopen at the regularly-scheduled times on Monday, Dec. 2.

Regional road and bridge updates

FM 720 North - The contractor is working on lime subgrade, placing asphalt, tying steel for southbound lanes from Martop to U.S. 380 and barricades. The contractor will continue to place concrete for inlet tops and sidewalks on southbound lanes. The project is on track for March 2020 completion.

U.S. 380 East - (Loop 288 to U.S. 377) The 95% plans were completed and submitted for review on May 20, 2019. (U.S. 377 to county line) Consultant completed work on 95 percent plans and submitted for review on July 26, 2019. Utility coordination meeting was held on Oct. 17, 2019. Meetings are coordinated monthly.

U.S. 377 North - Public meeting will be scheduled to coincide with 60 percent schematic delivery in spring 2020. TNP continues efforts toward the 60% schematic.

U.S. 380 Feasibility Study - Following public meetings in January; a second public meeting is tentatively scheduled for December 2019.

FM 428 - Project is from east Windsor Drive to West Sherman Drive/proposed outer loop. TxDOT to initiate feasibility study. Anticipate selection of firm by end of 2019.

FM 1385 – Work authorization for schematic and environmental documentation has been executed. Kick-off meeting was held on Oct. 17.

FM 2931 - Due to change in project managers at onset of project, TxDOT likely to schedule a second kick-off meeting, tentatively expected in late November/ early December 2019.

FM 455 – From west of FM 2450 to east of Marion Road; contractor submitted plans to TxDOT for utility relocations on Aug. 20 with a utility meeting held on Oct. 19. The contractor is revising the profile at Sam Bass Road to improve intersection sight distance. The contractor is finalizing the pre-95% plan review that will include a traffic control plan, signals and illumination. The 95% plans are on schedule for submittal in January 2020.

FM 455 at I-35 - Environmental clearance received on Oct. 7. The contractor continues progress toward pre-95% plan review that will include traffic control plan, signals and illumination. The 95% plans are on track for submittal in January 2020.

I-35 North - Environmental approval was received on Oct. 7 for the estimated \$546.5 million project from U.S. 380 to 0.7 miles north of FM 3002. The project received \$546.5 million in CAT 12 funding. Funding was approved by the Texas Transportation Commission on Aug. 29.

I-35E/Mayhill - This \$55.6 million project to reconstruct the interchange at Mayhill and I-35E is projected to begin in May 2021. The contractor finalized 60 percent design and submitted to TxDOT for review; anticipate receipt of survey on northbound frontage road in November 2019. First utility coordination meeting was held on Oct.

I-35/35E/35W Merge TxDOT and consultant are working on bridge layouts for approval from both the district and bridge division in Austin prior to 30 percent plans. The project received \$319.3 million in CAT 12 funding, which was approved by the Texas Transportation Commission on Aug. 29.

I-35E/Loop 288/Brink-

er/Mayhill – Anticipate the opening of the Brinker exchange soon, dependent upon signal installation. Asphalt paving on southbound main lanes, Brinker, Loop 288; concrete flat work; and constructing center median barrier are activities expected in October. Traffic switch occurred on Oct. 16 to move Loop 288 lanes to the outside under I-35E, allowing the contractor to construct the middle segment.



HOUSE BILL 2439

House Bills passed by the Eighty-Sixth Texas Legislature is causing cities in Texas to scramble, as they relate to development services. The House passed several bills that affect cities as they relate to development. H.B. 2439 became effective September 1, 2019, provides with some exceptions, that a governmental entity including a city may not adopt or enforce a rule, charter provision, ordinance, order, building code, or other regulation that (1) prohibits or limits, directly or indirectly, the use or installation of a building product or material in the construction, renovation, maintenance,

or other alteration of a residential or commercial building if the building project or material is approved for use by a national model code published within the last three code cycles. HB 2439 is known as "The Materials Bill" and basically states that a city can no longer regulate materials as it pertains to architectural, interior and exterior building product if the materials are allowed by a national code. An example is 100% masonry and that this or any other percentage of masonry could no longer be required. Basically any material that meets national code can be used in construction and the city has no way to regulate it. This also pertains retroactively to any requirements put into planned developments, etc., that they no longer stand. There may be some changes in a few years, but until then, the City of Sanger had to figure out how to address this and make it work. The city staff has been busy and came up with some guidelines

for builders.

After discussion, the mayor and city council had listened to the home builders concerns and came to a good compromise. Shortly after, a vote was held and passed unanimously on the following items. • Duplex buildings designed to appear as a single unit will have a statement added that anything previously platted as of the effective date in this ordinance would be exempted from the requirement; • Attached garage, 40% was the maximum allowable garage and with a three car garage it may be hard to get to the 40%. This requirement will now be: Attached garages with a minimum of 400 square feet; • Any garage facing a public street may not extend more than 10 feet beyond the front of the house. Council to allow staff to approve variance on non-typical lots and if staff can not work it out, that it would be presented to City Council for determination; • Any house elevation shall not be repeated on a group of three lots most directly across the street, nor shall it be repeated on two adjacent lots; •Reduce porch size from six foot requirement to four foot; • Window Shutters: delete "hinged" before the word panels (shutters). Not requiring hinged panels.

Lake Sharon Extension - The city has been working with the contractor and bond companies and anticipates the execution of construction documents by end of October 2019.


