

Robert Edwin Rector

April 17, 1934 - April 2, 2022 Uncle Bob, as he was known to us, was born on the Rector Farm just South of Sanger, Texas, to Sam Davis

Rector and Ruth Dean Rector. He was the youngest of their five children.

Uncle Bob attended Sanger Schools and graduated in 1954. Uncle Bob attended Texas A&M for a semester before transferring to North Texas State in Denton. Uncle Bob graduated from North Texas State in 1958 with a degree in Physics.

Uncle Bob then served his country in the U.S. Army receiving an Honorable Discharge on January 31, 1964. Uncle Bob was an Infantryman and often professed his dislike for the M1 Garand.

Uncle Bob worked for a time for the U.S. Government on Top Secret and Classified projects. He would never discuss those projects and literally took those secrets to the grave. He did tell us once that for one of those projects, he had to make sure that no one was following him. In order to do so, he had to travel to different cities across the globe and wait until he had clearance to move on to the next. After a six weeks journey, he finally arrived at his destination of Alice Springs, Australia, a remote post in the Outback.

After that, Uncle Bob worked as an Electrical Engineer. He worked for several companies and obtained several patents on inventions and new technology. He had to re-learn a lot of the technology as the industry moved from vacuum tubes to integrated circuits.

Uncle Bob was a lifelong Tennis and Golf player. He had a well-manicured grass tennis court in his backyard. He loved nothing more than to have friends and relatives to come over to play tennis.

Uncle Bob never married but he adored his nephews and nieces. He organized and held Christmas parties and Reunions just so he could get us together and see us all. His Christmas Drawing for the Grand Prize will never be forgotten by us, especially those of us who were fortunate to win.

Uncle Bob was preceded in death by his parents and brothers: Jack Rector, Sam Rector, and Ray Rector. He was also preceded by one nephew, John Rector.

Uncle Bob is survived by his sister, Patricia Blalock of Duncanville; sister in law, Bobbie Lee Rector of Decatur, Texas; nephews and nieces: Rex Rector of Arlington, Texas; Barbara and Terry Ohnstad of Littleton, Colorado; Eddie and Cynthia Rector of Santa Fe, New Mexico; Dale and Mary Lynn Rector of Crowley, Texas; Lee Ann and Mitch Arrington of Bridgeport, Texas; Mark and Susan Rector of Paradise, Texas; Rhonda and Curtis Enis of Decatur, Texas; Byron and Susan Blalock of Quitman, Texas; Susie and Harry Hall of Grand Prairie, Texas: John and Patricia Blalock of Quitman, Texas; Amy and Cole Starr of Tyler, Texas.

available to service the various parking areas around the courthouse and across the street.





WHAT'S IN THE BOND?

GRADE REALIGNMENT

dollars are being spent wisely.

In order to address projected enrollment increases, grade realignment will occur at Butterfield and Chisholm Trail Elementary Schools. This will reduce the number of students and increase the functional capacity at the elementary level within the district.

ADDITIONS AND RENOVATIONS

Clear Creek Intermediate will have a classroom addition and renovations made that will increase the school's functional capacity. This will include a storm shelter, and renovations to the cafeteria and kitchen to match the increased capacity. Capital improvements to the campus including fire protection and controlled entry will also be included in the proposed bond.



FOR 2020/21, SANGER ISD RECEIVED A 98 OUT OF 100 FINANCIAL INTEGRITY RATING WITH THE TEXAS EDUCATION AGENCY.

SAFETY AND SECURITY

The safety and security updates in the bond package include new construction safety standards for the proposed high school, a security vestibule added to Chisholm Trail Elementary, and fire sprinklers installed at Clear Creek Intermediate.

The proposed new high school will provide new science labs, built to the current standards set by the Texas Education Agency. The proposed repurposing of the current high school will ensure that current TEA middle school science lab standards are met.

If approved, the new high school will more than double the space available for both the Health Occupations and Culinary Arts programs. These programs provide students with an opportunity to participate in a work-based learning environment, earn certifications and participate in activities that prepare them for today's labor market.

The proposed new high school will provide additional space for SISD's Fine Arts programs. The instructional and practice space square footage for band and choir will more than double, allowing more students to participate.

AGRICULTURAL SCIENCE CENTER

The current Ag barn was constructed in 1978 and does not have space for large livestock. Bond 2022 includes construction of a new Ag Science facility, with more than 65 pens with turnouts for large animals, exercise area, storage, lockers, and multiple wash and trim stations. It will be designed to allow future jackpot shows to be hosted by our FFA.

ATHLETIC ANNEX

Bond 2022 includes construction of a new athletic annex. All boys and girls outdoor sports will be consolidated in to a single building, including Cross Country, Track, Soccer, Tennis, Softball, Baseball, and Football. A training room for student athlete treatment and instructional space for CTE will also be included.



PREPARING OUR DISTRICT FOR GROWTH

Our district is growing. The Sanger ISD student population is projected to increase by almost 40% within 10 years. That's 1,000+ new students in classrooms and participating in programs across

months learning about school finance, facilities assessments, tax impact data, demographic projections, and more.

The committee process led to the recommendation for a SISD 2022 Bond that includes a new High School and Athletic Annex, a new Ag Science Facility, additions and renovations to existing buildings to increase capacity and improve safety and security.





That fire was lit in me by Linda Tutt when I was accepted into the PALS program at Sanger High School. I transformed my desire to help into a 22+ year career in Law Enforcement. But with time comes promotions and I found myself in an office a lot. As a result of being "out of touch" from the community as a command-level staff member, I found other ways to stay involved in helping others. I was on the Board of Directors for Youth and Family Counseling of Denton County, the Texas Peace Officer Memorial Board of Directors and was a member of the Denton County United Way Speaker's Bureau. With the assistance of several friends and business owners in the Sanger community, I also facilitated several programs to assist the victims of Domestic Violence in Denton County with the Denton County Friends of the Family emergency shelter. I have decided to focus my desire to serve others here in my home town and felt that my love for the community and the school district would be best served as a School Board member.

9. What do you believe are the most important projects to be started or completed in the next

two years for Sanger ISD? Regarding future "brick and mortar" type projects, I think the construction of a new High School, and the expansion and remodeling of Clear Creek Elementary as well as a few of our other facilities are past due!!! We need to upgrade our facilities to create space and to incorporate some of the latest safety features for our children. From a "concept" standpoint, I think our district needs to continue to grow the district's Career and Technical Education (CTE) and Fine Arts programs. So many of our children are leaving SHS with real-life work experience leading to better career opportunities as the result of the CTE programs. I understand some of the community's reluctance to support the bond when they don't have the details and positive impact of the bond laid out in front of them. Meet Animal Control Officer Sara Sexton. Sara was born and raised in North Texas and has spent all of her adult life working with or around animals. She has served as the Animal Control Officer in Dallas and Addison, and she worked for a vet clinic and the SPCA. She proudly lives here in Sanger with her two cats and one dog. During a ride-a-long with Sara in late March, I came to understand exactly what an Animal Control Officer does, and I learned a little about Sara. the Sanger

Animal Control Officer.

The official job description of an Animal Control Officer is to enforce the laws that deal with the care and treatment of

animals, protection and rescue of domesticated animals, and maintain public health standards. After my ride-a-long, I saw that the role encompasses much more.

As we drove through each neighborhood on patrol, it became apparent that Sara had spent a great deal of time building relationships with the residents of Sanger. We were stopped many times by different residents so that they could say hello. But more than that, Sara has built relationships with so many people. She knew of residents that had been under the weather, so, in her patrols of the neighborhoods,

she stopped a couple of times to check on those individuals. Some of these residents have been so helpful to rescue missions for animals. They put out live traps to help catch stray kittens, and when they know of someone who has lost their pet, they are quick to call Sara if they spot the missing animal.

On our ride out, we received a call about an animal that had gotten out of his cage. Luckily, we were able to catch the dog. She was so scared. Animal Control is not like we used to see in cartoons. An animal gets out,

the "dog catcher" is called, and the animal goes to jail. That is not the case at all. Our primary goal is to reunite the pet with its owner. For this little lady, we were able to do just that. One of our other officers knew the owner and called him. The neighbor that lived beside the owner was familiar with the dog and assisted Sara with getting her back into the cage. We were able to stay onsite until the owner

> arrived and was able to get a found pet back to

secure the break in the fence. We cannot always

its home immediately. In these cases, the City of Sanger partners with All American Dogs in Pilot Point. They are a no-kill shelter. Whenever an animal has to go to AAD, the policy is for them to keep the animal three days before making it eligible for adoption. In


these cases, the City of Sanger and AAD make every attempt to find the animal's owner. Images are posted on social media channels hoping that the owner or someone who knows the animal will help us get it back home.

Beyond rescuing a stray pet or assisting with removing the snake in your backyard, Animal Control provides code enforcement that is meant to protect both the animals and their owners. Additionally, Sara spends a great deal of her time educating the public on the laws to protect your animals. For example:




Within the City limits, each property (not houses on the property) can have a maximum of three (3) animals? It is unlawful to knowingly possess a dog or cat that has not been vaccinated against rabies? See Ordinance here. The City of Sanger has a leash law that states that all animals be kept under restraint at all times.







against the bond, take the time to attend one of the bond information meetings and come away as supporters of the bond. I also feel that this bond is very conservative in regards to what the district needs. The district is simply out of room.

11. What 2 specific things would you most like to see changed pertaining to the school system? #1. Regarding education as a whole, I think our teachers have had a significant amount of their time and creativity taken away by the standardized testing and the supporting material that comes with it. I believe that they went into the teaching field because they love kids and love the creative challenge teaching offers. The state mandated standardized tests and the material provided to support it, has cut into their teaching time, and has cut into their ability to be fun and creative with the lessons. #2. This may be a reach, but I wish there was a way for a district to be funded based on projected growth instead of a daily roll-call. This is a problem SISD and most school districts in the DFW area are facing. People are moving to this area in record numbers and we are all trying to play catch-up in regards to classroom space.

12. What are your most important overall goals for Sanger ISD? 1. Attendance. I want to help grow our district to where every kid wants to be in school. In order to achieve that goal, we have to offer as many special programs that we can possibly fit inside the walls of each campus. These programs are what the kids enjoy doing and might be the only reason they show up. 2. Faculty; I also want our faculty and staff to WANT to come to work. If we can create and maintain the culture and atmosphere in our schools that foster positive growth at all levels, then we can continue to be a successful district. I know that this culture exists, and we are a successful district. I've seen it first hand with how kids respond to some of the administrators. There are tons of smiles and a lot of success. 


