SUPER SAVE'S LAST DAY IS APRIL 25

The Super Save Grocery Store is closing permanently after Sunday, April 25th because of TxDOT FM 455 and HWY I-35 expansions. The original store Burrus Supermarket opened September 10, 1979 and was remodeled and expanded on the north end in August of 1989. Burrus sold to Bill Kiker in September of 2003 and the store name changed to Super Save. Around 2009 Homeland Grocery out of Oklahoma bought out Mr. Kiker and has owned the store up to now. Homeland leases the buildings of all their grocery stores and without another suitable building to move in Sanger, it is closing. The building will be leveled. It is an ideal place

for a convenient store and gas station, since Snap Shop and Shell have closed on the other side of the freeway. The City of Sanger has had a few inquiries regarding grocery stores, but at this time, that is all they have had, according to Ramie Hammonds, Development Service Director for the City of Sanger. A retail shopping center is planned, just north of Sable Creek where Pepper Belly BBQ is, and a rendering shows a grocery store as the anchor of the project, but a grocery chain has not signed on yet. With Super Save closing, it should expedite the process. Super Save will be open all day Sunday from 7 a.m. to 10 p.m.

Lake Ray Roberts host Bass Pro Shops US Open Regional at marina

The path to the Bass Pro Shops U.S. Open National Bass Fishing Amateur Team Championships – a first-of-its-kind amateur fishing tournament offering the biggest payout in freshwater fishing history – continued on Texas’ legendary Lake Ray Roberts this past weekend. The weigh-in was originally scheduled for Saturday, but was moved to Sunday because of the wet conditions from the recent rains.

It was one of 8 regional qualifying events being held nationwide. The Lake Ray Roberts event featured 250 two-person amateur teams competing for a first place \$50,000 prize, with the top 40 teams qualifying for the National

Championship. The Bass Pro Shops US Open National Championship, held this November at Big Cedar Lodge on Missouri’s famed Table Rock Lake, will be internationally broadcast and offer a \$1 million cash prize to the winning team.

The Lake Ray Roberts qualifying event featured anglers ranging in age from 6 – 84 years old. The amateur field of 250 two-person teams consisted of a cross-section of families and active military/veterans adding to the fun of the tournament including:

- 59 military veterans
- 3 active military
- 35 father-son teams
- 10 mother-son teams
- 14 husband-wife teams

- 11 brother-brother teams
- 2 father-daughter teams
- 20 female anglers

Under the visionary conservation leadership of Johnny Morris, Bass Pro Shops has made significant contributions to the future of the outdoors in the Lone Star State as a longstanding conservation partner of the Texas Parks & Wildlife Department (TPWD). recreation and wildlife we know today wouldn't be possible without the dedication of partners like Johnny Morris and Bass Pro Shops," said TPWD Executive Director Carter Smith. "We are particularly grateful for their continued support of our fisheries habitat enhancement efforts statewide and saw

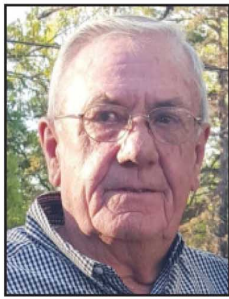

Barbara Lynn Draper, 68, of Denton, died Saturday, April 17, 2021 at her home in Denton.

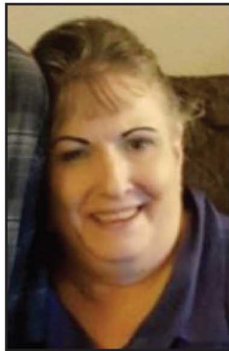

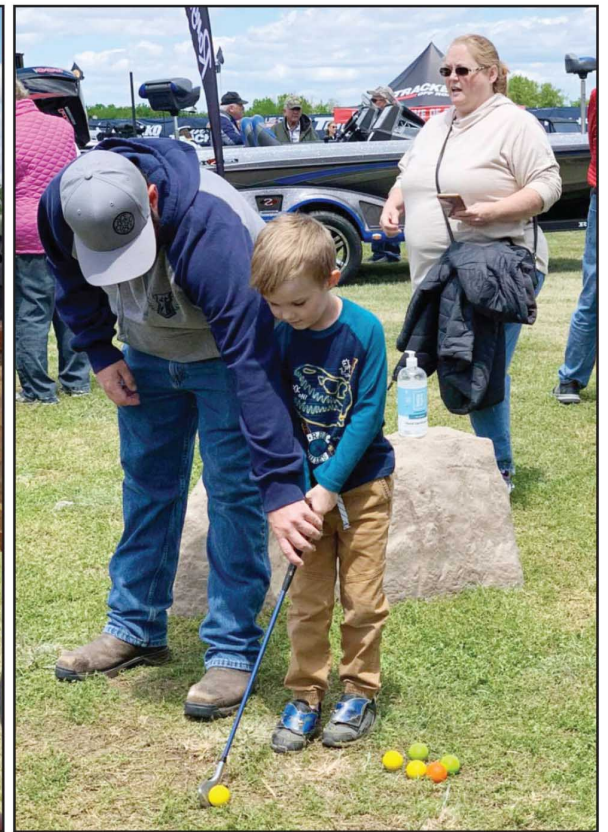
our collective work come full circle for anglers at the Bass Pro Shops US Open qualifying event on Lake Ray Roberts.”

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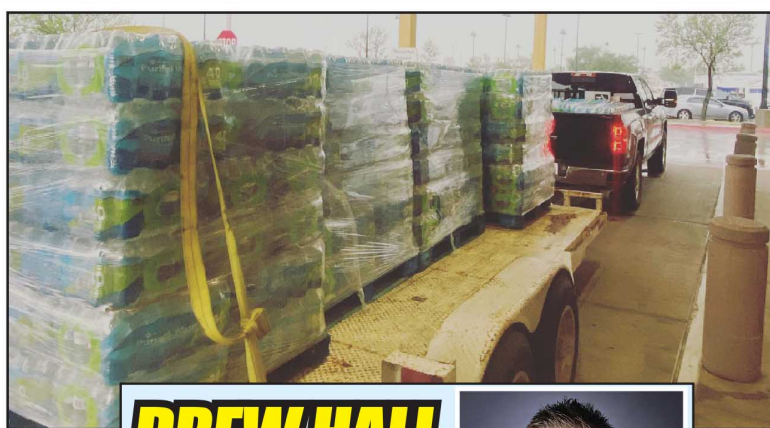

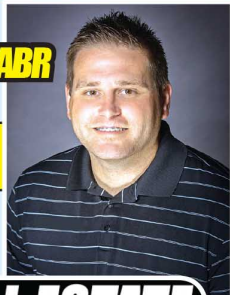

7. Why did you choose to run for City Council? Truthfully, I think the City of Sanger can do better in many aspects. We need to hire a City Manager that is qualified and has the same goals that the City of Sanger needs. Preferably, a City Manager that has seen growth. As someone who runs / walks the streets of Sanger frequently, there are some that could use a lot of work. As mentioned previously, we need to take a hard look at where all of the money is going with the City currently and start allocating money to not temporarily fix, but to completely redo some of these streets that are Public Right-Of-Way. This will be a long process but the goal is to not have to deal with this again for years and years to come. Money will have to come from appropriate saving while also cutting out what I believe, are many unnecessary costs.

11. What do you believe are the most important projects to be either started or completed in the city in the next two years? As asked by these questions, I would seem to think many of the folks of Sanger agree that the future growth is the most important thing with the City in years to come. Overall, the City of Sanger did well during the snow storms but we need to work on growing our utilities to handle this growth. So a short and sweet answer, infrastructure for growth as well as providing quality City Employees the resources they need in order to best succeed.

12. Is it important to you to keep the property tax rate from rising for the residents of Sanger? Absolutely, many cities in the Metroplex are becoming unaffordable. We need to help keep the City of Sanger an affordable place to live.

13. Do you think our main street/downtown is healthy and successful? If not, what would you do to change that? This is a hard question because I believe they were headed in the right direction before COVID. Although I wouldn't say it was successful even then, I would say they were getting there. I believe we are going to need to encourage businesses to get into some of those downtown buildings. The City of Sanger owns a large lot downtown (What used to be the old Hardware Store many many years ago, as well as the old Kings building), the City also takes up many lots for City purposes downtown. If you want that area to be successful, we are going to have to get more than one or two businesses down there. You'll need a few things that can attract many different types of people and the Chamber, the City and the Zoning Board can help encourage future businesses in that direction.

14. What's most important for the city as far as growth and new homes being built? First and foremost, make sure they are doing it correctly. Second question is, what kind of homes do we want. Do we want more starter homes, do we want this to be a younger community and if so, can our schools handle a younger community (This comes back around to working with the Chamber and School Board)? How does our zoning currently set up for what is going where and is that still the direction the City is heading? So to answer the question, the Planning and Zoning Board and the City Council need to evaluate what the goal is, the Zoning Board needs to evaluate if the current zoning designations line up with the goal, and the City Council / Zoning Board need to take a hard look at the Muni Code deciding what is and isn't allowed in certain zoning designations. Me personally, I don't want to be giving people a 20 foot back yard, especially if we are wanting this to be a younger community. Children need room to play.

15. If you could change one thing in our zoning code, what would it be and why? I don't have a major problem with our zoning code currently. We can all agree our streets need improvement, some more than others! Unfortunately, it is not just the streets. There are underground utilities and infrastructure that need attention as well. There is more infrastructure in need of repair than funds available. Additional funding does not just 'grow on trees' - to increase the financing for streets would decrease funding elsewhere in the budget, but there are ways to reduce the expense of a project. For example, grouping large purchases/projects in the bidding process can sometimes reduce the project's overall cost. I would recommend prioritizing our City's projects, and exploring ways to reduce costs.

11. What do you believe are the most important projects to be either started or completed in the city in the next two years?

I think the infrastructure of our city is a top priority. City staff have done a fantastic job prioritizing projects in the last two years and have made significant road improvements. Those that do know me know I take a lot of pride in my work and I would also take a lot of pride being a City Council member.

9. What can the City do to attract more businesses to Sanger?

A business wants to come to a new city for several reasons but I believe mostly they want to thrive and be successful. I want to keep an open mind because every business is unique, let's help them in any way we can. I would like to keep an open mind with businesses on property tax reductions for their 1st or 2nd year to help them off to a great start. If Sanger businesses prosper the city of Sanger will prosper.

10. What would you say to residents about the current state of the streets that are in need of repair? And if you believe more money should be made available for ongoing street repair, where will this money come from? The streets are in dire need of repairs and some of the roads I can't even drive down and yes this does cost money. I would like to sit down with a committee to review the budgets allocated as well as where is the best way to raise the money. I also would like to be a part of reviewing the bids to insure the city of Sanger is not taken advantage of.

11. What do you believe are the most important projects to be either started or completed in the city in the next two years? All projects are important so I don't like being limited to two but I see the 455 expansion and fixing the city streets are a top priority.

12. Is it important to you to keep the property tax rate from rising for the residents of Sanger?

Yes it is very important to not raise property taxes, if they could be lowered I know the citizens would be very happy. Sanger residential is rapidly growing and commercial growth is on the horizon bringing in more tax dollars, let's review the budget. I also would like to see some tax credits for homeowners that do repairs, maintenance or painting on the exteriors to give them a reason to fix up their houses and bring up surrounding property values.

13. Do you think our main street/downtown is healthy and successful? The downtown area is fairly successful but I would like to see it continue to grow, I do like the hometown atmosphere.

14. What's most important for the city as far as growth and new homes being built?

I currently work with the Sanger building department regarding new home construction. They have implemented some new policies that I like, for example the 15 point guidelines for front elevations to give the new housing market more character. I also back their new policies for larger lots and to have higher minimum square footages. I like diversity on residential developments as well as new home construction.

15. If you could change one thing in our zoning code, what would it be and why?

I am not aware of any changes at this time, and I am looking forward to our updated Comprehensive Plan.

If I could change one thing with our current zoning code. I like diversity so I would like to see the city implement some mixed sizes into the mix like 1/4, 1/3, 1/2 acre lots.

16. If you received a \$1 million grant to use for the city any way you wanted, what would you do with it and why?

If Sanger received a \$1 million dollar grant, I would want to have a discussion with the town council members and Mayor to discuss because they might have some great ideas as well. Keep an open mind with the other members but my vote would be to use a good portion of that for repairing the damaged streets throughout the city.

17. Where are your favorite places to spend time in town?

You might run into my wife and I walking around the city parks or eating at a local restaurant.
