Two suspects charged with murder of **Kenneth George**

James Auxier, 29, was taken into custody Thursday, March 8 and Leonardo Villarreal, 38, also was arrested that night, a spokesman for police said. Both suspects were charged with murder, and both have been released from Denton City Jail after posting \$100,000 bail each.

They are accused of killing Kenneth Wayne George, a 58-year-old Krum resident, who was born and raised

in Sanger, according to a family member. George was pronounced dead three and a half days after the assault on Feb. 24, and his cause of death officially has been ruled a homicide due to blunt force trauma of the abdomen, Tarrant County Medical Examiner spokesman Troy Taylor said. The injuries he suffered in the assault led to his death, authorities said.

Feb. 20. Responding officers spoke with George, who suffered a large laceration to his left eye and a fractured eye socket, police said.

According to police, footage showed Villarreal violently striking Kenneth with a axe handle. He used both hands to swing the stick and struck him several times,

George fell out of the camera's view after Villarreal struck him in the head and torso, police said. Auxier is then seen approaching Villarreal and George. Police said Auxier "jumped in the air and stomped down with his left foot where [George] was on the ground," according to the affidavit.

Auxier then attempted to strike George again with the stick before Villarreal appeared to push Auxier away, the affidavit said. Auxier went inside the bar and returned to the area with several more people, the document states. He can be seen tossing the stick away from the scene, police said.

Three and a half days after the beating, around 5:30 a.m. Feb. 24, Krum paramedics were dispatched to George's home in response to an "unconscious fainting," according to Krum Fire Department Capt. Russell Woody. Woody said medics performed CPR on George before transporting him back to Texas Health Presbyterian Denton. George was pronounced dead upon arrival.

He was born on May 17, 1959 in Sanger, Texas to Bill and Joyce (Yarbough) George. He was married to Laura Park George. Kenneth graduated from Sanger High in 1977. He loved the outdoors with family and friends. He was a loving son, husband, father and grandfather. His great love was his children and his granddaughter. Kenneth will truly be missed.

Kenneth is survived by his father, Bill George, wife, Laura George, son, John W. George, daughter, Holly Jones, granddaughter, Alexis Lawson, sisters, Kathy Johnson and husband Ricky, Connie Odem and a very extended family. He is preceded in death by his mother, Joyce Yarbough.

Sanger FFA Buyers Club teaching valuable lessons

Sanger FFA and Jr FFA members have been busy all year with judging competitions and various vocational activities. Several FFA members have also been caring for livestock projects, many of them since the summer. Have you ever thought about what happens at the end of the show season, when all the travel and competition is over? These students have been preparing for this since Day 1.

Purchasing the animal is only the beginning. In an effort to secure scholarship opportunities, students put in countless hours feeding, washing and caring for their animals. Feeding time happens before school and after school. Then, there's washing and cleaning pens, dealing with the occasional sick animal. Weekends are often spent practicing for shows and repairing broken stalls or water leaks. The first hard freeze means heading to the barn to install heat lamps.

When competition time rolls around, there are hours spent traveling to stock shows, only to wait in line for hours to unload what seems like the entire barn from the trailer. Students have prepared for months in hopes their prized animal will place high enough in the competitive class to 'make sale'. 5 minutes in the ring to appeal to the judge to select your animal over the other 20 or so. Sometimes you win, sometimes you don't. The show results are simply one person's opinion on a given day. Regardless, everything is loaded back on the trailer and the trip back

For those who are fortunate enough to make the sale at a major livestock show, joy is coupled with a sigh of relief. Recouping their initial investment and often times breaking even on the expenses. For the select few who place and sell high, celebration is in order. The project was a success and there is a profit!

home begins.

For those who simply did not catch the judge's eye that day, there is stress. A perfectly suitable animal, with the same amount of effort applied, just did not get 'the look'. There is the mounting feed bill and all

the other activities that were put on hold by the family, to

make this project possible. Enter the Sanger FFA Buyers Club. This small support team, a part of the Sanger FFA Alumni and Friends organization, was created with the sole purpose of coaching these students along the way towards the end goal - a positive return on their investment. Through the organized effort of the Buyers Club, students consider the final sale of their animals even before the purchase. They are taught to identify fundraising outlets through the network of businesses they already frequent. The Buyers Club subscribes to the Co-op theory. Although



many in the community would love to support a child by purchasing their animal outright, it's often times, not feasible. Instead,

students discuss donation opportunities with the feed store where they purchase feed, the dry cleaners where



Here are five helpful options, available for download whenever you like.

• Free tool stops creepy online tracking:

When I say "creepy ads," you almost certainly know what I mean: those ads that follow you from one website to the next, echoing the searches you recently ran on Amazon or Google. All you did was look up "canvas bags" once, and now little pictures of canvas bags are popping up in the margins of your browser.

This kind of targeted advertising is based on "cookies," tiny files that your computer downloads without your knowledge. You can disable cookies, but an enormous number of popular websites use them to function. You can't even log onto Facebook without accepting the burden of cookies.

A free extension called Privacy Badger is available for Chrome, Firefox, and Opera, and it's designed to spot third-party scripts. Basically, it will automatically stop your computer from downloading a cookie or tracker. This will prevent unwelcome software on your computer, plus it'll kill the targeted advertising that seems to read your mind.

• Turn your tablet into a second monitor:

Many office workers are accustomed to working on a dual-screen setup, and they know how helpful this is for multitasking. You can move entire windows from one screen to the next, juggling several programs at the same time.

But what if you could do this at home? Duet gives you this ability, connecting a PC or Mac to an iPad or iPhone. The touch-screen will continue to work, or you can use your mouse or track-pad in both screens

Meanwhile, the connection between the two devices is your tablet or phone's regular charging cable. When these cords and connectors are in good condition, they two machines communicate effortlessly – unlike similar setups that use WiFi.

Tinker with Windows 10 security settings:

For the record, I don't think "O&O ShutUp10" is the best name in the history of branding, but let me tell you: This is some useful software for Windows users. The program is designed to help you organize the security settings on Windows 10.

Like all technology, using Windows is a delicate balance between efficiency and security. Windows 10 can easily access your email, your calendar, and your location, among countless other points. Gathering this information can help you in different ways, but it also makes you vulnerable to data collection.

O&O ShutUp10 lets you manually tinker with your security settings, so you can decide what your computer accesses and how it uses the information it gathers. The tool also rates whether certain security settings are recommended, guiding you through the process. This is handy because most of us have no idea what settings strike a perfect balance between privacy and convenience.

• Free alternative to Photoshop:

Photoshop has become the industry standard for image manipulation, and most serious photographers use Adobe products to perfect their landscapes and portraits. But Photoshop is also complicated to use, and the creative cloud requires a subscription service that gets expensive over time.

One of the best alternatives is GIMP. This isn't your run-ofthe-mill free photo editor: GIMP can add many of the textures, layers, and special animations that Photoshop can. Its arsenal of painting and drawing options can help you illustrate as well.

GIMP has a very different interface from Photoshop, and some people scratch their heads over its workflow. But generally speaking, GIMP is a lot simpler to use. It's also free to download, and the software is regularly updated. GIMP has come along way since its clunky inception, and more and more Photoshop users are making the switch, or even cutting their teeth with this zero-cost alternative.

• Know if someone is watching you through your webcam:

A hacked webcam is the stuff of horror movies: Most desktops sit in bedrooms or living rooms, and there are lots of intimate moments that a stranger could see. Laptops move around, and a stranger can watch your entire day transpire, anywhere the device is opened up. Worse, you may not have any idea that your computer's camera is being used as an invasive periscope. Hacked webcams are notoriously hard to diagnose.

Spying is bad enough, but when those images (and audio) are captured, they can be duplicated, manipulated, and spread around the Internet faster than you can say "Photoshop." Once your images are out there, they are almost impossible to delete.

This is why developers created Who Stalks My Cam, a program that not only determines whether your webcam has been hijacked; it does so in real time. The program runs continuously, so the moment your camera is compromised, you'll be alerted. Who

Stalks My Cam then works to defend your camera from intruders.

Note: Who Stalks My Cam only works for Windows. The
Mac equivalent is Oversight, which works very similarly. Oversight monitors your webcam use, and it also keeps track of which
apps have permission to access your camera.

What Should Investors Know About Recent Volatility?

As you may have heard, the stock market has been on a wild ride lately. What's behind this volatility? And, as an investor, how concerned should you be?

Let's look at the first question first. What caused the steep drop in stock prices we experienced on a few separate days?

Essentially, two main factors seem to be responsible. First, some good economic news may actually have played a significant role. A 17-year low in unemployment and solid job growth have begun to push wages upward. These developments have led to fears of rising inflation, which, in turn, led to speculation that the Federal Reserve will tighten the money supply at a faster-than-expected rate. Stocks reacted negatively to these expectations of higher interest rates.

The second cause of the market volatility appears to be simply a reaction to the long bull market. While rising stock prices lead many people to continue buying more and more shares, some people actually need to sell their stocks – and this pentup selling demand, combined with short-term profit-taking, helped contribute to the large sell-offs recently.

Now, as for the question of how concerned you should be about this volatility, consider these points:

- Sell-offs are nothing unusual. We've often experienced big sell-offs, but they've generally been followed with strong recoveries. Of course, past performance is not a guarantee of future results, but history has shown that patient, persistent investors have often been rewarded.
- Fundamentals are strong. While short-term market movements can be

caused by a variety of factors, economic conditions and corporate earnings typically drive performance in the long term. Right now, the U.S. economy is near full employment, consumer and business sentiment has risen strongly, manufacturing and service activity is at multi-year highs, and GDP growth in 2018 appears to be on track for the best performance since 2015. Furthermore, corporate earnings are expected to rise this

So, given this background, what's your next move? Here are some suggestions:

- Review your situation. You may want to work with a financial professional to evaluate your portfolio to determine if it is helping you make the progress you need to eventually achieve your long-term goals.
- · Reassess your risk tolerance. If you were unusually upset over the loss in value of your investments during the market pullback, you may need to review your risk tolerance to determine if it's still appropriate for your investment mix. If you feel you are taking on too much risk, you may need to rebalance your portfolio. Keep in mind, though, that by "playing it safe" and investing heavily in vehicles that offer greater protection of principal, but little in the way of return, you run the risk of not attaining the growth you need to reach your objectives.
- Look for opportunities. A market pullback such as the one we've experienced, which occurs during a period of economic expansion and rising corporate profits, can give long-term investors a chance to add new shares at attractive prices in an environment that may be conducive to a market rally.

A sharp market pull-back, such as we've seen recently, will always be big news. But if you look beyond the headlines, you can sometimes see a different picture – and one that may be brighter than you had realized.







they have show clothes starched, and the gas station where they fuel up daily, etc. Through small donations from these entities (average donation about \$100), the Buyers Club is able to pool resources and purchase animal projects from the students at the final show, the Denton County Youth Fair Show and Sale (March 31). Thus, keeping money circulating within our community and achieving a positive return for the students.

Sanger students learn to start considering the end result BEFORE making the decision to purchase an animal. They are individually responsible for getting out and raising funds while being accountable to the group and their peers to pull their own weight. It allows everyone within the community to participate, not just the traditional agricultural entities. It teaches responsibility and builds character, as students must be willing to fully discuss the positives and negatives of their project with prospective donors.

So, if you received a visit from a group of students, please ask them to talk to you about their projects. Ask them to show you pictures. No matter your background or experience, agriculture touches each one of us and these students have all accepted the responsibility to carry on the future. They are passionate and committed to what they are doing. After all, while you are sleeping in on Saturday morning; chances are, they are at the barn and up to their knees in hard work!


