Sanger Area Historical Society Remembers...

American socialite and political "Hostess with the mostest" lived in Sanger

The Gulf, Colorado, and Santa Fe Railroad was built through Sanger in late 1800s and many people used the railway system for traveling to longer distances. These steam engines pulled car after car, and with a diner car attached, it was a great way to travel and much quicker than traveling by car after the automobile was introduced.

William Balser Skirvin was a wealthy Oklahoma oilman and founded the lavish Skirvin Hotel in 1911 which is still operating in downtown Oklahoma City under the name Skirvin Hilton Hotel. William and his wife, Harriet Elizabeth Reid Skirvin had several children and upon Mrs. Skirvin's death in 1908, he became the caretaker of his children. Their oldest child, Perle, born in 1889, was to became a famous D.C. hostess and Ambassador to Luxembourg for the United States.

Mr. Skirvin would load the family onto a train to travel to Dallas for shopping. The Skirvin family would stay in Dallas for several days, and then ride the train back to Oklahoma City with their purchases. The Gulf, Colorado, and Santa Fe Railroad had several stops along the way to Oklahoma City, and because it was a long trip, they would depart from the train in Sanger and spend the night in a local boarding house. Someday Perle would remember the lovely community with its white-painted trees planted along the old Highway 77, then known as the Pike, and later to become Fifth Street when Highway 35 was opened in 1959.

And now you wonder how this is pertinent to the Sanger Museum and Sanger



Area Historical Society? Perle was born Pearl Skirvin, in Sturgis, Michigan, and later changed her name to be spelled as Perle. Perle married George Mesta in 1916 but widowed in 1925 and inherited \$78 Million. She settled in Newport, Rhode Island, and then moved to Washington, D.C. in 1940. It is written that she owned homes in Newport, Rhode Island and a Pittsburgh suburb of West Homestead, but was never written that she had her hideaway home in Sanger. Perle needed a quiet, safe, unknown location away from every news-seeker, and Sanger was just the spot. She rented half of a duplex from the Gobers, a local couple, and from all indications, they were the only ones in Sanger to know who she was and her stand-

ings in the political world. The writer of this article remembers a friend living next door to Mrs. Mesa and asking if we would disturb her with our noisy slumber parties and her mother said she didn't know the lady's name and she was there infrequently and never bothered anvone.

Perle was an early supporter of Equal Rights Amendment, was a registered Republican but switched her party to Democratic as an early supporter of Harry S. Truman. President Truman awarded her the Ambassador to Luxembourg which was a successful appointment as Mesta established monthly G.I. parties for the troops and by 1953 had entertained 25,000 men and women in the service and all was paid for by her personally. Mesta lost her appointment when a new administration and party leadership changed in Washington, D.C. Luxembourg gave her a warm and emotional send-off according to reports.

Perle Skirvin Mesta returned to Oklahoma City in 1974 and died the next year. She is buried in the Mesta Mausoleum in Homewood Cemetery in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania next to her husband.

She lived in the righthand side of the duplex. It is located on Plum Street at the southwest corner of Plum and Eighth Streets.







Ronald Dwayne Browning





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

Denton NCTC campus to open

A new North Central Texas College campus opens this fall in Denton. The former home of the Denton Record-Chronicle has been remodeled into the First State Bank Exchange at 316 E. Hickory St. in downtown Denton.

The 45,214-square foot center will offer transfer credits and associates degrees including the Associate of Arts, the Associate of Science, the Associate of Arts in Teaching,

which will be the main focus of the campus. FSB Exchange has nine classrooms, two large lecture classrooms, a single large lecture hall, a testing center, computer lab, security office and NCTC's new Mane Stop ¬¬¬- a one-stop-shop to serve students.

The campus offers extended class hours to accommodate student needs and provides 300 parking spaces in a new parking garage as well as easy access to the DCTA train station and commuter buses.

Denton County Health Department nationally recognized

The Denton County Health Department recently earned national recognition not once but twice.

Denton County Public Health (DCPH) has received national recognition from Project Public Health Ready (PPHR) for its ability to plan for, respond to, and recover from public health emergencies. Currently, DCPH is the only local health department in North Texas with PPHR recognition. DCPH is now the eighth department in the state to receive this recognition since the inception of PPHR in 2004.

Our DCPH Dental Clinic team was selected by the National Association of County and City Health Officials' (NACCHO) Model Practice Program as a National Promising Practice. This Promising Practice award was received for the integration of a dental clinic into public health, and the team's dedication to excel-

Regional road and bridge updates

FM 720 North - The contractor continues to place reinforced concrete pipe on

southbound lanes and place concrete paving on northbound lanes out to U.S. 380 with roadway excavation and barricades. On southbound lanes, lime and asphalt application are the main activities with drainage the focus on southbound lanes. No traffic changes are expected. The project is on track for March 2020 completion.

U.S. 380 East - (Loop 288 to U.S. 377) The 95% plans will be provided along with the -050 CSJ submittal at the end of July/first of August 2019. (U.S. 377 to county line) The consultant continues to work on the 95 percent plans. Estimated timeline for submittal is end of July/first of August 2019.

U.S. 377 North - TNP submitted 30% schematic to TxDOT for review on June 28,

U.S. 380 Feasibility Study - Following public meetings in January, a second public meeting is tentatively scheduled for September.

FM 1385 - Work authorization for schematic and environmental documentation is in process. Anticipate execution of work authorization before end of July 2019.

FM 2931 - Work authorization for schematic and environmental documentation has been executed. Pending survey and SUE files, expected October and November respectively.

FM 455 – From west of FM 2450 to east of Marion Road, TxDOT indicated that the 30% submittal was 60% level. The contractor is addressing 30% (60% level) comments received from TxDOT and continues to work on plans for commencement of utility relocation coordination.

FM 455 at I-35 - Work toward the 60 percent plans adequate for commencement of utility relocation coordination. Environmental clearance is projected for October 2019.

I-35 North - Environmental approval is anticipated in October 2019 for the estimated \$757.7 million project from U.S. 380 to .7 miles north of FM 3002.

I-35/35E/35W Merge -Survey on the \$242 million project is on schedule for late August 2019.

I-35E/Loop 288/Brinker/ Mayhill – Retaining wall, entrance ramp on northbound main lanes an asphalt paving of southbound main lanes are expected this month.

Union Hill/FM 455/FM 2164 Realignment Project -This project has been complet-

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

How Does Social Security Fit Into Your Retirement Income Strategy?

It might not be on your calendar, but Aug. 14 is Social Security Day. Since it was enacted on Aug. 14, 1935, Social Security has provided some financial support for millions of Americans during their retirement years. While Social Security benefits, by themselves, probably aren't enough to enable you to retire comfortably, they can be a key part of your overall retirement income strategy – if you use them wisely.

To help you make decisions about Social Security, you will need to answer these questions:

When should I start taking my benefits? You can take Social Security once you reach 62, but if you wait until your full retirement age, which will probably be between 66 and 67, you'll get much bigger monthly checks, and if you wait until 70, you'll get the biggest possible payments. Before deciding when to begin receiving your benefits, you'll need to weigh a few factors, including your estimated longevity and your other sources of income.

How should I consider potential spousal benefits? If you are married, or if you're divorced but were married for at least 10 years, you could receive up to half of your spouse's full retirement benefit (offset by your own benefit, and reduced if you claim early). If you outlive your spouse, you could claim survivor benefits, which can provide either your own benefits or 100% of your deceased spouse's, whichever is larger. Consequently, the higher-earning spouse might want to postpone taking benefits for as long as possible to maximize the survivor benefit.

How much can I earn without reducing my Social Security benefits? If you are younger than your full retirement age and you are receiving Social Security, the Social Security Administration will withhold \$1 from your benefits for each \$2 you earn over a certain threshold (which, in 2019. is \$17,640). For the year you reach your full retirement age, your benefits could be withheld by \$1 for every \$3 you earn over \$46,920. But once you reach your full retirement age, you can earn as much as you want without your benefits being withheld, although your benefits could still be taxed, depending on your income.

How much of my pre-retirement income will Social Security replace? Generally speaking, you should expect Social Security to replace slightly more than a third of your pre-retirement income. However, the higher your income during your working years, the lower the replacement value of Social Security will be.

What other sources of retirement income should I develop?Contribute as much as you can afford to your IRA and your 401(k) or similar employer-sponsored retirement plan. You may want to consult with a financial professional, who can look at your entire retirement income picture and recommend moves to help you achieve the lifestyle you've envisioned for your later years.

Keep in mind that your decisions about Social Security filing strategies should always be based on your specific needs and health considerations. For more information, visit the Social Security Administration website at socialsecurity.gov.

One final word: You may have concerns about the stability of Social Security. While no one can predict the future, many potential solutions exist to put the program on more solid footing. Consequently, try to focus on the actions you can control.







Videoboard sponsorship and fund drive benefits Career & Technical Education program

If you have driven by the high school athletic facilities recently, you may have noticed new additions to the football. baseball, and softball fields. Each field received a new scoreboard made possible by the generous contribution of \$250,000 by DATCU. The contribution was part of a 10-year partnership with the Sanger ISD and Sanger Education Foundation (SEF) intended to benefit the Career & Technical Education (CTE) program.

If you are wondering how athletic scoreboards benefit the CTE program, the answer is simple. The football scoreboard is much more than a scoreboard. It is a state of art videoboard with capabilities such as live game feeds, high resolution game time graphics, and of course the ability to promote local businesses. Local businesses can purchase sponsorships. Some of the sponsorships allow for videos, which are produced by the students of the CTE program. The revenue generated goes back to the CTE program in the form of scholarships and/or to purchase additional equipment instructional grants.

Sixty students have elected to participate with this project in the Fall—far exceeding expectations. In order to meet the needs of so many students, additional funding is required—specifically to purchase additional cameras. The SEF is leading the funding effort in two ways: 1) marketing providing sponsorship packages to local businesses and 2) organizing a \$10,000 fund drive to purchase cameras and accessories.
