Tom Cook, a formerly enslaved African American on the frontier, owned a blacksmith shop that has been excavated by TxDOT. Tom Cook was recognized in a 1918 Denton County history book as one of the best citizens who "never failed to answer the roll call in a time of danger..."

Archeologists are recovering discarded broken wagon parts, forged horse and mule shoes, forged showing nails, hardware, tools and a ceramic smoking pipe.

TxDOT is actively working with various groups to identify anyone connected or interested to these sites.

The direct descendants of Tom Cook, including his great-,great-grandson and great-,great-,great-granddaughter, are actively involved in site visits and excavations of his blacksmith shop. Archeologists also hope to gain understanding of: 1) What kind of blacksmith was Tom Cook? 2) Who were his likely clientele? 3) How did he gain his skills as a blacksmith? Was it during his previous enslavement in South Carolina?

Volunteers from the North Texas Archeological Society are working alongside TxDOT at the site excavations.

Other interested parties include the Denton County African American Museum, NAACP's Denton County chapter, the Sanger Historical Society, the Oral History Program at the University of North Texas, the Denton County Genealogical Society, Sanger Mayor Thomas Muir and more.

Christine Marshall Waggoner, a resident of Bolivar has posted a link on her facebook page about the project.

TxDOT will widen FM 455 between Sanger to the east and Bolivar to the west. The project is scheduled to begin after August 2022 and is being coordinated with the Bolivar archaeology project.

HISTORICAL TIMELINE FOR BOLIVAR ARCHEOLOGICAL SITES DALLAS DISTRICT **DENTON COUNTY, TEXAS**

Sartin Hotel (41DN593)

1820/1870 - Jesse Sartin was born in 1820, and lived in Bolivar by 1870, where he operated a stagecoach stop.

1881 — Jesse Sartin purchased Block 1, Lot 6, in Bolivar on July 13, 1881. There is unconfirmed evidence that a hotel was already on this parcel, and that Sartin expanded and improved the building.

1881 to 1899 — The Sartin Hotel was in operation during the later days of the Chisholm Trail (to 1886), and for some time afterwards.

1899 — When Jesse Sartin died on July 24, 1899, he was buried in the Bolivar Cemetery next to his second wife, Salle. No documentation has been found that reveals the fate of the Sartin Hotel after

The appearance of the Sartin Hotel and specifics about its operation also remain unknown, but contemporary accounts and oral history recollections provide the following details. The Sartin Hotel:

- * was as a stop on the Chisholm Trail,
- * served as the stagecoach stop for overland lines through Denton County,
- * was a two-story, L-shaped wood building and,
- * had a "flowing well in the lobby" and a "saloon nearby."

Thomas Cook Blacksmith Shop (41DN617)

1826 (or 1840) — Thomas Cook was born enslaved in South Carolina, but records offer conflicting birth years.


1857 — Thomas Cook was brought to Tarrant County, Texas, as an enslaved person, according to a voter's registration roll.

1865 — Thomas Cook became a free man on Juneteenth, June 19.

1867 to 1870 — Thomas Cook first appeared as a Texas citizen in voter's registration rolls and tax records that show he resided in Tarrant County.

1872 to 1895 — Thomas Cook resided in Denton County by 1872, although he may have arrived up to a year earlier. Ad valorem tax records and the 1880 population census confirm that he lived with his family in Bolivar through at least 1895.

1898 — Thomas Cook died in Denton County on January 5, 1898.

Bolivar, Texas

1859/1861

After New Prospect was established, citizens voted to change the town's name to Bolivar in 1861. The town is 3 miles east of the postbellum Chisholm Trail.

1867 to 1886

The first cattle drive up the Chisholm Trail passed a few miles west of Bolivar, delivering cattle to railheads in central Kansas. During this time, the Chisholm Trail became a major economic boom for towns along its route.

1886

The Gulf, Colorado, and Santa Fe Railroad built a new track through northcentral Texas, several miles east of Bolivar. causing local economic decline. At the same time, the small water stop at Sanger flourished as a railroad town.

1916

The Bolivar post office closed, and mail was forwarded to Sanger.



FM 455 Road Improvements

The Texas Department of Transportation is in the process of widening FM 455 in Denton County, and this activity will impact the historic Sartin Hotel and the Thomas Cook blacksmith shop, which are on either side of this road. In compliance with the National Historic Preservation Act (federal law) and the Antiquities Code of Texas (state law), these sites have been determined historically significant. Consequently, historical and archeological investigations are being undertaken to salvage important information about these significant places and the people associated with them. Sanger ISD Learning Platforms

Dear Sanger ISD Families,

COVID-19 has presented many challenges across the world. The primary responsibility of Sanger ISD is to provide students with an exceptional education while providing for their health and safety. Sanger ISD has provided learning opportunities for both remote and in-person learners as methods of instructions so that students can have access to curriculum and academic success. Upon reviewing grades and attendance from our first two grading periods, Sanger ISD administrative staff and Board of Trustees have decided to revise the learning plan options for our students. We believe that in-person learning instruction provides students with additional support and access to teachers, academic conversations with peers and stability leading to higher academic success.

We have been asking our teachers to start their day earlier than ever to deal with the challenges associated with COVID-19. While doing all the little things to keep everyone safe we have several teachers teaching on two different platforms serving both in-person learners and remote learners. Our staff has performed all these tasks while putting in more hours and days than any school year prior. Despite all of our efforts, we have learned the online learning has not been as successful as we have hoped for our remote learners. After reviewing all of our data, we are transitioning our current online students back to in-person learning.

After careful consideration Sanger ISD will be suspending our remote learning platform effective January 8, 2021. Beginning on January 11, 2021 all students are expected back in the classroom for in-person learning unless they meet one of the exceptions below:

- 1. A student is medically fragile or lives with someone who is considered medically fragile. Documentation from a medical doctor is required and must be submitted to the campus principal on or before January 8, 2021.
- 2. A positive COVID case requires the student to be quarantined in accordance with the guidelines established by TEA as follows: Any student who has tested positive for COVID, or who experiences the symptoms of COVID, must stay home throughout the infection period and cannot return to campus until all three criteria have been met:
 - At least one day (24 hours) has passed since recovery (resolution of fever without the use of fever-reducing medications);
 - The individual has improvement in symptoms (e.g., cough, shortness of breath);
 - At least 10 days have passed since symptoms first appeared.
- 3. A student who has had close contact with someone who is COVID positive must be quarantined for 10 days. The student shall return to in-person learning after their quarantine period.

Students who do not meet the qualifications to remain in remote learning must return to school in-person on January 11, 2021.

While we want to see all of our students return to school in-person, we want to allow enough time for you to make the decision you feel is best for your child. Students who do not meet one of the above exceptions are expected to return to campus. Students not returning to school have the following choices:

- Withdraw to homeschool
- Enroll in private school
- Request to transfer to a district offering remote learning



Welcoming the new year may feel a bit different this year, given the challenges of 2020 and the inability to celebrate together.

For many people, the yearly date change — adding one more year to life's tally — puts a greater focus on long-term goals than busy lives usually allow. For many, this leads to the tradition of New Year's resolutions, a chance to consider our progress on becoming the "ideal self" many people hope to achieve by the end of their

Even with the knowledge that the focus will shift back to the short-term demands of day-to-day by mid-January, it is valuable to consider those longer-term aspirations, if for no other reason than for people to remind themselves that there's more to them than the harried exhausted person who, at the end of the day, wants nothing more than to get into their PJs and play a video game, binge-watch a favourite TV serial, or read a current novel.

But this year, thinking about the long-term is much more difficult. The pandemic has given us all a different experience of time. The pandemic has not only served as a visceral reminder that something unexpected can land in our well-envisioned path, halting all progress. It has also made the path beyond the pandemic unclear.

As many pundits are noting, a "return to normal" meaning life exactly as it was before COVID-19 entered our vocabulary — is highly unlikely. The future has become less predictable, which also means that setting long-term goals is much more difficult. It's hard to imagine an ideal self without knowing what that self will be experiencing.

Short-term goals

As a psychologist, I think resolutions for 2021 should be much more short-term than usual. It is probably challenging enough to figure out what's needed to make it through the months until everyone is vaccinated and can start to make their way back into a more social

You might be thinking that this hardly seems like a good use of once-a-year resolutions, but even though these goals will be very short-term, this is valuable given that public health leaders are warning that these particular months are likely to be the hardest of the pandemic. So even though these goals will likely only be needed for a few months, they can be vital for determining our state when the pandemic comes to an end.

Living through several months of pandemic uncertainty and restrictions has likely given many people a pretty good idea of which personal vulnerabilities this constrained life chafes against. Some people may be struggling to keep their emotional balance. For others, the absence of friends and even casual acquaintances may be driving them mad. Others might be panting to get back to the gym.

These personal points of pain can give people some idea of what resolutions they might make. Addressing those specific points may help enable people to care for themselves well enough to arrive at the pandemic's end with some semblance of good physical and mental

Reviewing the advice that mental health professionals gave at the beginning of the pandemic may be helpful in figuring out your specific short-term resolutions to deal with personal challenges. Or you, like many others, might have discovered the healing properties of nature during this time, as documented in a preprint (not yet peer reviewed) study. If so, your resolutions could be about making sure you continue those activities and visiting your favourite nature spots during these winter months. My own resolution, for instance, is to spend at least five minutes each day appreciating the birds in my yard, which never fails to lift my spirits.

Pandemic lessons

For those who can't resist thinking about long-term goals, despite the uncertainty that this pandemic year has introduced into the world, you could review what vou've learned during the pandemic. Long-term resolutions could be based on consideration of three things:

What do I want to keep from changes I made to cope with the pandemic?

What do I want to reclaim from the pre-pandemic

How would I "build back better" if I were in charge

of the world or my neighbourhood? Each of these things will require some long-term goal focus, and can help you imagine a new ideal self for the post-pandemic times.

Like Christmas 2020, New Year's 2021 is likely to be unique in many people's memories. Many people have gone out of their way to make these moments as tolerable as possible, given the circumstances, but these new ways to commemorate the holidays are unlikely to become traditions, or things people will want to repeat in subsequent years.

Approaching 2021 resolutions by harvesting any bright spots or treasures that have revealed themselves during this unusual time may help illuminate a new path to follow once the pandemic has ended.
